

# DEI Educational Resource Happy Sukkot: Feast of Tabernacles Quick Facts Sheet

## 1. What is Sukkot?

Sukkot, also known as the Feast of Tabernacles or Feast of Booths, is a Jewish holiday that celebrates the harvest and commemorates the Israelites' 40 years of wandering in the desert after leaving Egypt.

#### 2. When is it Celebrated?

Sukkot begins on the 15th day of Tishrei in the Jewish calendar, usually falling in September or October, and lasts for seven days.

# 3. Significance of Sukkot

It celebrates God's protection and provision during the Israelites' time in the wilderness, highlighting themes of gratitude and faith.

# 4. What is a Sukkah?

A sukkah is a temporary hut built outdoors during the festival. It symbolizes the fragile dwellings the Israelites lived in during their journey.

# 5. The Four Species

Jews traditionally use four types of plants—etrog (citron), lulav (palm branch), hadas (myrtle), and aravah (willow)—to perform a waving ritual during Sukkot prayers, symbolizing unity and blessings.

#### 6. Alternate Names

Sukkot is also referred to as the "Feast of Ingathering," marking the end of the agricultural season and the gathering of crops.

# 7. Command to Rejoice

Sukkot is a joyful celebration, and the Torah commands the Jewish people to rejoice and give thanks for God's provision.

# 8. Pilgrimage Festival

It is one of the three biblical pilgrimage festivals (Shalosh Regalim), during which Israelites historically travelled to the Temple in Jerusalem.

## 9. Hospitality (Ushpizin)

During Sukkot, it is a custom to invite guests, both real and symbolic (like biblical ancestors), into the sukkah, emphasizing the values of hospitality and community.

## 10. Simchat Torah

Sukkot concludes with the holiday of Simchat Torah, when Jews celebrate the completion and restart of the annual Torah reading cycle.
